## Open morning Saturday 16th November 10am - 12noon to view W.W.1 plaque

As you will read in this edition there is no war memorial in Wrelton for the three men from the village who died in W.W.1. Two members of the local woodcarver's group have created a plaque which will be hung in the Village Hall. On Remembrance Sunday, 10th November, descendants of all three men are meeting at the Village Hall to unveil the plaque. This event is limited to the men's families and those who have been involved with the project. However, on Saturday 16th November all villagers are invited to pop into the Village Hall between 10 and 12 to view the plaque and read information on each man. The village will now have a permanent memorial to these men who lost their lives fighting in France.

## Santa's Sleigh is on its way to Wrelton with Ryedale Lions

As part of the run-up to Christmas the Ryedale Lions are planning a series of visits to the villages and towns in our area, bringing Santa to the kids (well, the good ones) and asking for those with a few pounds spare to help the Club raise funds so we can help the local community over the current difficult times.

### Wrelton's First World War dead.

A piece on this topic was first written about a year ago but for several reasons it was thought best to wait for further information before completing it. Also, as things turned out, in 2023, several ladies in the village contributed to a poppy display on the Village green and the idea of creating a permanent memorial was raised. The result of this is covered elsewhere.



Wrelton had three soldiers who died in the First World War. The village has no memorial. Their names appear on the one outside Pickering Memorial Hall and in St. Andrew's Church, Middleton. The three men were Aubrey Adams, Michael Edward Allan and Albert William Shaw

Aubrey Adams was born at Lingcroft, near Naburn, York in 1894. At some time after 1911, the family moved to Aislaby. The army documentation gives Wrelton as his home. Private Adams, 24340, served in the 5<sup>th</sup> Battalion, Yorkshire Regiment. He died of wounds on 2<sup>nd</sup> April 1918, aged 24 and is buried in Namps au Val British cemetery in the Somme District of France. Although unmarried, family stories say he was engaged and his fiancé received his death plaque. His mother died in 1930. Her husband, Thomas, continued to receive 6 shillings per week pension, until he died in 1935.

Michael Edward Allan (sometimes spelt Allen), was born in Wrelton and baptised (Allen), in Middleton Church on 25<sup>th</sup> April1884. His parents were Tom and Sarah Ann. On 26<sup>th</sup> November 1903, he enlisted for 3 years' service with the Yorkshire Regt. After only 26 days his father bought him out! In June 1911 he married Alice Hill in Helmsley. When war broke out he reenlisted and served with the 4<sup>th</sup> Battalion, Yorkshire Regt. Private Allan, 7562, died on 17<sup>th</sup>( some documents say 16<sup>th</sup>) September 1916. He is buried in Dernancourt Communal Cemetery Extension in the Somme District. Alice and three daughers (until they were 16) received a pension.

Welsh Guardsman Albert William Shaw died, according to his death certificate, on the 21<sup>st</sup> February 1919 at the Connaught Hospital, Farnborough, presumably as a result of injuries received. His Commonwealth war grave is in St. Andrews churchyard, Middleton. Albert was born in Carlton St. Hessle, Hull on 18<sup>th</sup> July 1888, became a joiner and probably moved to Wrelton about the time of his marriage to Lydia Ringrose in Middleton Church on 25<sup>th</sup> August 1913. By 1916 he had been called up but his employer, Mr R Surnett, appealed on the grounds that, as a timber feller, he was "indispensable". The appeal was dismissed on 2<sup>nd</sup> September 1916. Pension records show that after Lydia's death in 1918, her mother, Mrs Ann Ringrose, received the pension until her death in 1943.

More detailed information on the three men will be available to view at the Open Morning at the Village Hall on Saturday 16<sup>th</sup> November between 10am and 12 noon.
